Brain

Delayed social skills Anxiety and depression ADHD, ADD



Hearing

Loss of hearing at birth or during development



Growth

May be shorter than their peers or grow later



Speech

Attendance

Communication challenges and language delays

More likely to miss school due

to appointments and illness



Heart & Circulation

Fatigue, shortness of breath, blue tint to skin



Gross Motor Skills

Challenges with coordination/walking



Environment

May be more sensitive to temperature and/or air quality




